

NIACC INTERNATIONAL STUDENT HANDBOOK





Welcome to North Iowa Area Community College! International students are an important part of our campus community. We strive to provide the best possible services and programs to make your college experience enjoyable and successful.

As a current international student you have both benefits and an obligation to maintain your visa status while studying here. While you will receive all rights and privileges as all other full-time NIACC students, there are certain guidelines you must follow to help maintain that status. Below are some policies set in place by the college and the Department of Homeland Security to help you maintain that status and function smoothly while here:

Course Work and Maintaining your Status

You must take and maintain a full-time schedule. Dropping below a full-time course load will cause you to become out of status. Students must contact Dr. Rachel McGuire, Vice President of Student Services, for permission to drop below 12 hours.

If you were to withdraw or be expelled from the college for any reason you will be considered out of status. Students would have 15 days to leave the US. You must also be ACTIVELY attending your classes to maintain your student status and to continue living in Student Housing. Flex Courses cannot count as face to face classes. A student is requested to be enrolled in at least 9 out of 12 credits required, as face to face, to be in compliance with SEVIS. Only in your last semester can an international student be less than full-time, if they only need a few classes to graduate. **This must be in the last term of study at NIACC**. When SEVIS is marked with the student's last term of study, the student has 60 days from the last day of the term of study to transfer our or leave the country. On day 61 SEVIS will automatically change the student's status to completed and a student would be out of status, if still in the country.

Legal Issues

Many students who come to study in the United States can face legal issues that are new to them. Those legal issues include, but are not limited to:

- -Obtaining a Social Security Number
- -Obtaining an identification card or driver's license
- -Obtaining a Work Permit (EAD) OPT

Finding or Needing a Lawyer to seek:

-Declaring Permanent Residency (Green Card) -Declaring US Citizenship

If you find yourself faced with some of these issues while a student at North Iowa Area Community College, we recommend that you first contact Dr. Rachel McGuire, Vice President of Student Development & Success, Administration Building, AB103I or by calling her directly at 641-422-4104. Dr. Rachel McGuire has access to the necessary people and information that may help you make decisions that are right and timely for you.

The Department of Homeland Security is the governing body that regulates all matters related to immigration. As of March 1, 2003, all functions of the former Immigration and Naturalization Service were moved into three Bureaus within the Department of Homeland Security. Here are a few terms and abbreviations that you will need to know while studying here at NIACC:

USCIS-

The United States Citizenship and Immigration Services is responsible for most of the applications and petition adjudications that were previously done by INS. These would include change of non-immigrant status, authorization for off-campus work programs, reinstatement to status, etc.

USICE-

The **United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement** is responsible for immigration investigations, detention, removal, intelligence, and SEVIS.

USCBP-

The **United States Customs and Border Protection** is responsible for immigration inspections at U.S. ports of entry, for the border patrol, and for the Customs Service.

SEVIS-

The database operated under the SEVP (**Student and Exchange Visitor Program**), designed to allow the collection of information regarding foreign students and exchange visitors in the United States. All F-1 student I-20's are issued through the SEVIS database.

Exchange Rates

When studying in a foreigncountry, you will have to deal withcurrency exchanges. Dependingon where you are studying,currency exchange rates can eitherhelp you get great bargains ormake your stay even moreexpensive. However, no matterhow strong your home currency isin relation to the local currency,you will want to make sure you getthe best exchange rate possible inorder to keep your expenses low.

An Exchange rate represents the relative process of two currencies. For example, the dollar-euro exchange rate implies the relative price of the euro in terms of dollars. If the dollar-euro exchange rate is %0.95, it means that you will need \$0.95 to buy €1.

Whenever possible, try to avoid the exchange companies and booths at airports. Although they are certainly convenient, they frequently charge very high prices in exchange for that convenience. If you need cash, it is best to find a large bank.

Converting from one currency to another can be confusing, and if you're dealing with large sums or if you're traveling in a country with high inflation, you will be grateful to have a calculator to help you with your calculations.



Banking

As an international student studying in the United States, having a US bank account will make managing your finances significantly easier. With a US bank account, you can deposit your scholarships, stipends, loans, all of which are typically paid by check– as well as money from home.

With a bank account, you can pay all of your bills by check, and manage your bill payments online. In addition, may banks issue debit cards with a MasterCard or Visa emblem, which enables you to use the card to make purchases anywhere that accepts credit cards.

There are two types of bank accounts in the U.S. They are Checking Accounts and Savings Accounts. **Checking Accounts** allow you to frequently deposit and withdraw money. They are a great way to pay your monthly bills. When you open a checking account, it usually comes with a checkbook and a bank card. There are usually minimum monthly balances and service fees, and these vary depending on the type of account you open. Most international student only need a checking account, which they use for managing living expenses while at school.

A **Savings Account** is for long term deposits for accruing interest. The interests, minimum balances, and service fees will vary from bank to bank. As an international student, you will probably

How to Open a Bank Account

Although many banks advertise that you can open an account over the phone or online, you should plan to open an account in person. As an international student, you do not fit neatly into any category set by US Banks, and it will be easier to deal with any complications in person. In addition, it's always useful to establish a face to face relationship if you require additional services.

When you go to the bank to open a bank account, you will need to bring:

- Your full name, home address, home telephone number, your campus telephone number, and your college address (Letterhead showing the local address—i.e. utility bills or apartment or NIACC Housing Contract)
- Current/Valid Passport
- NIACC OneCard Student ID
- I-20, DS-2019 or I-797 approval notice
- Any secondary form of identification (birth certificate, state driver's license)
- Enrollment verification letter from you r school (Copy of Registration which may be obtained in the Student Development Office)

You will also need the funds you want to deposit and open the account with. Every bank has slightly different requirements, so make sure you ask beforehand so you don't forget something you need.

International Student are required to enroll in health insurance through First Agency International Student Medical Insurance upon enrollment in courses at North Iowa Area Community College. The insurance costs are added onto the Fall and Spring bills and are paid automatically through NIACC. (For more information go to: <u>www.1stAgency.com</u>) See Sandy Harrington in the Student Development Office, to obtain a copy of your insurance card. You will be automatically enrolled upon your arrival to campus. This information will also be emailed to your MyNIACC email accessible through your Trojan Home portal. **\$50 all cause deductible**

Vouchers

In addition, voucher's are available to see a doctor and should be used to receive a discount that helps towards your deductible. Work Study/On Campus Job Opportunities

Work Study

The purpose of the program is to provide employment opportunities for students who need to work in order to pay their educational expenses and at the same time provide them an opportunity to gain valuable work experience.

Wait List

Though Work/Study is not guaranteed, if you are interested in an on-campus job, you can submit a Work Study Waitlist request form at the NIACC Financial Aid Office. After U.S. students, that have been awarded Federal work study, have the opportunity to seek out jobs and if there are still positions available, the financial aid office will contact International students on the waitlist to review the list of available positions. If an International Student is hired in a position, they must contact Sandy Harrington to assist in receiving a social security card before they can begin employment.

<u>Note: NOT all International Students may qualify to work, please</u> <u>contact Dana Heimbuch and Sandy Harrington if you have questions</u> <u>as they will walk you thru the proper process needed.</u>

The same rules apply for all work study students (limited to 6-10 hours/week, complete I-9, W-4, sexual harassment training, etc.)

Payroll

Payroll time periods always end the second Friday of the month (refer to back of timesheet for specific dates)

- Timesheets must be signed by the student and supervisor and turned in the Monday following the second Friday of the month
- All work study positions are paid \$9.15/hour
- Student's may not work more than 6-10 hours per week

• Students are paid the last working day of the month Work study earnings are applied to your NIACC student account. If your account is paid in full, you can pick up your paycheck at the NIACC Business Office with a photo I.D.

You must bring:

- Current/Valid foreign passport accompanied by the approved I-94 documenting applicant's most recent admittance into the United States
- Your current school enrollment papers for an Iowa public or private school
 - Statement from a financial institution (bank, credit union or other financial institution)
 - Birth certificate

What Happens if I have a car accident?

First and foremost, if you have a car accident, and you are not hurt, you should contact the police by dialing 911 for further help. After the police have been contacted, you should call your insurance provider. Once the police have arrived at the scene of the accident, you will be responsible for making a statement, telling the officer what happened; he/she will file a report and you are responsible for filing one with your insurance agent.

If you are injured in the accident, a by-stander is likely to call the police and ambulance. The same process with the police and the insurance agency should be followed.

Traveling Outside the United States

This includes Mexico, Canada, Bahamas, & Puerto Rico. If you are interested in traveling beyond the United States, we recommend that you contact Dr. Golman (641-422-4106 or by email Bridgett.Golman@niacc.edu) To do any traveling, you are required to have your I-20 signed by a school official and with you and to have a valid passport. **Reminder:** Failure to produce a valid passport and signed I-20 will cause you to be quarantined by the INS for further investigation.

A great option is StraightTalk since it offers a variety of plans, but without the need for contracts. The available plans include \$35 with 2GB data and unlimited call and text nationwide, \$45 with 8GB data and unlimited call and text nationwide, \$55 with 12GB data and unlimited call and text nationwide, \$60 with 8GB data and unlimited call and text worldwide, \$30 with 100MB data and unlimited texts, \$10 with international calling cards, and the extended plan with 8GB data and unlimited call and text nationwide.

You can use this plan with your own phone, under their bring your own phone program. StraightTalk is a prepaid plan, meaning that you prepay for the services ahead of time, and there are no overage charges. It also means more data for the same price compared to post-paid plans.

Cell Phone Plan Options:

Two-Year Contracts

These are the most common contracts in the U.S. Contract plans offer lower monthly rates and very low prices on new phones compared to prepaid plans. Typically, the best prices are offered to customers who sign two-year contracts for cell phone service. While the rates are lower, terminating a contract early requires the customer to pay a large penalty. To qualify for a contract plan, a cell phone provider will generally review the applicant's credit history. Since new international students do not have Social Security numbers or credit history in the United States, they typically require a security deposit which could be \$400-\$500. As with any contract, please ensure that you understand all requirements and charges before signing it.



Pay-As-You-Go or Prepaid Plans

These are easier for new International students to obtain because they do not require a Social Security number and/or a credit history check. These "pay-as-you-go" plans use the same cell phone networks and offer the same services as contract plans do, but usually at higher rates. Advantages of these plans include no longterm contracts, security deposits, or penalties for cancellation. Traveling Outside the United States

NO Drinking/NO Smoking


In 1984, the United States Congress passed the National Minimum Drinking Age Act, which required states to raise their ages for purchase and public possession to **21** years of age.

The legal drinking age in the state of **Iowa** is **21**. The unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of illicit drugs and alcohol on College property or as a part of any college-sponsored activity is prohibited. Violations of this policy will result in disciplinary action, up to and including expulsion, and may have legal consequences. There is **NO Drinking** allowed ANYWHERE on the NIACC campus.

In the spring of 2008, Iowa lawmakers passed legislation to protect employees and the general public. The Smoke free Air Act (ISAA) prohibits smoking in enclosed areas within places of employment as well as some outdoor areas. **NIACC** is a **SMOKE FREE** Campus. There is **NO** smoking allowed ANYWHERE on the campus including parking lots.

Sexual Harassment

The College recognizes that harassment related to an individual's sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression can occur in conjunction with misconduct related to an individual's race, color, ethnicity, national origin, religion, age, marital status, or disability. Targeting individuals on the basis of these characteristics is also a violation of the community standards. Under these circumstances, the College will coordinate the investigation and resolution efforts to address harassment related to the targeted individual's sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression together with the conduct related to the targeted individual's race, color, ethnicity, national origin, religion, age, marital status or disability.

Slang Terms

As you encounter your classmates, watch American television, or meet people through organizations, clubs, church, or in the community, you might find they use a language you are unfamiliar with. To help you navigate language barriers, here are a few slang terms to help you:

Term:	Definition or usage:			
Bet	affirmation, agreement, or approval along the lines of "Cool!" or "I'm down!" It can also suggest doubt or disbelief: "Yeah, sure."			
kk	meaning OK, is just pure acknowledgement; your message is received.			
Hit me up	Call or Text me			
Give me a break	Meaning to stop some action or statement; or to leave another person alone. Can be used as an expression of disbelief			
Hook-up or hooking-up	Traditionally used to ask you to meet your friends, but may have a sexual connotation			
Minding your p's and q's	Also, used to remind someone to do a complete job and not to leave pertinent information out. Remind someone to use their manner's and be polite			
My bad	Used instead of saying "I'm wrong" or an "I've made a mistake."			
On reserve	Often used in reference to additional course materials that can be found, at the student's convenience, in the library			
Rule of Thumb	Implies a standard or set of guidelines that are generally followed by all			
Shut up	Traditionally a derogatory way to ask someone to 'be quiet', but now is used as an expression of disbelief			
Switching gears	Traditionally used in reference to driving a car, but can also mean change the subject being discussed			
T.M.I	Meaning "too much information"; used when too revealing or personal information is shared			
Thumb's up	Meaning Okay or a job well done			
What's Up? Sup? Suh?	Used to ask you how you are or what you are doing			
Bae	No, it's not short for babe or baby. The letters actually represent the phrase "before anyone else," usually referring to the speaker's significant other, girlfriend or boyfriend			
Lit	"Lit" can mean cool — but some people also use it as a synonym for drunk or high			
Woke	While it's sometimes used in a sarcastic sense, getting called "woke" is usually a compliment. It means you're knowledgeable, sympathetic and aware, especially when it comes to contentious debates around race and gender			
Cat Call	To whistle or yell something sexually suggestive to a stranger, usually in passing. Often by males as a way of getting attention from females. It is not recommended and can be considered harassment			
GOAT	Abbreviation for Greatest of All Time			
Spill the Tea	gossip or personal information belonging to someone else; the scoop; the news			
Sic/Sick/Bussin'	Cool or tastes really good			
Dope, That's Dope	Cool or Awesome			
OMG!	Oh my Gosh or Oh my God			
To Ghost Someone	dating term that refers to abruptly cutting off contact with someone without giving that person any warning or explanation for doing so			



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
