In this presentation, Al will share how he became involved with researching the men of the USS Arizona, the process for obtaining service records of the men, the results of the research, statistics on the men, share stories of the men, and include emotional insights of the families.

Al Johnson was born and raised in Northfield, MN area, graduating from John Marshall High School in Rochester

in 1964. He enlisted in United States Navy on July 15, 1964, made six top secret patrols aboard the USS Nathan Hale (SSBN-623), a fleet ballistic missile submarine. Three of the patrols were out of Guam while he was stationed in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. He was qualified as a scuba diver while in the Navy. He was discharged from the Navy in March 1971 and worked at the Prairie Island Nuclear Plant in Red Wing, MN until 2005. He obtained a B.S. degree from Winona State University in Physics. Al is a member of Pokegama Lake Association where he served on the board of directors for eight years as the secretary, and as Chairman of the Lake Improvement Committee for 17 years. Currently Al is the secretary and webmaster for the Pine County Genealogical Society completing extensive genealogical research including the men of the USS Arizona (BB-39).

Whitehead Educator of Distinction for Iowa in 2006. In addition, Beth Ann was named as the Educator of the Year by the Clear Lake Area Chamber of Commerce in 2013 and named as a Distinguished Alumni by the Clear Lake Alumni Foundation in 2014.

Beth Ann has published and edited several books, and is currently working on a third book. She continues to be an active member of American Battlefield Trust. She works with living historians in Iowa to spread the story of Iowa in the Civil War. She was elected president of the Clear Lake Historical Society and is busy working to build the community's interest in its own local history. Beth Ann and her husband Mark, a retired Iowa State Patrol Trooper, live in Clear Lake and have two grown daughters.



Voices: Women in the United States Navy

This presentation, the third in a series about women in the United States Military, will offer information about women's service, its history, current status, and stories, and a brief review of Navy nurses service. The Navy authorized the enlistment of women on March 19, 1917. The United States Navy Nurse Corps was officially established by Congress in 1908 (May 13th); however, unofficially, women had been working as nurses aboard Navy ships and in Navy hospitals for nearly 100 years. The Corps was all-female until 1965 and as of 2020, there were 69,629 total women on active duty in the US Navy, with 11,076 serving as officers, and 58,553 enlisted.

Dr. Charlene G Gooch, Ph.D., M.S. B.S. A native lowan, Charlene left the state after high school to pursue goals in education, a career in the Army Nurse Corps (Vietnam Era), and clinical and academic careers in nursing, family therapy, and university employee assistance programs. Her degrees were awarded by lowa State University, Texas Women's University, and University of Maryland. Dr. Gooch has made suicide prevention and intervention her main focus since 2010, serving on the Massachusetts Coalition for Suicide Prevention (2010-2015), as a Director on North lowa NAMI Board of Directors (2018-current), and as an academic and community suicide prevention educator.

The Enneagram is a system of personality typing that describes patterns in how people interpret the world and manage their emotions. The Enneagram describes nine personality types and maps each of these types on a nine-pointed diagram which helps to illustrate how the types relate to one another. The origins of the Enneagram are something of a mystery, possibly dating back to the time of the ancient Greeks, although its exact

history is disputed. It is a synthesis of a number of different spiritual traditions, including elements of Christianity, Judaism. Buddhism. and Hinduism

Karen Young has a Master's degree in Religious Education from Southern Methodist University and Doctor of Ministry degree in spiritual formation from Saint Paul School of Theology.
