of lowa. Includes a summary of the five aquifers (water bearing rock formations) that provide 80% of Iowa's drinking water.

Fast-paced, big-picture overview tailored to the general public. Includes a brief review of geologic principles, touches upon the formation of the Mid-Continent Rift (directly beneath Mason City), the formation of Iowa's sedimentary rocks, meteorite craters and falls, extinct animals (e.g., mammoths, dire wolves, saber-tooth cats, etc.), glacial deposits and more.

David Miller holds BS and MS degrees in Geology from Iowa State University, and has 35 years' experience in geology and ground-water resources. He currently works for the Iowa Department of Natural Resources.

MACBETH

Join the Provocative Literature Study Circle in an exploration of The Scottish Play, one of Shakespeare's most well-known and approachable creations; we will touch on the theatre superstitions surrounding its production. "Is this a dagger which I see before me?" (II.i.48) Ambition, self-doubt, transgression, and regret are themes that transcend time and culture. "By the pricking of my thumbs. / something wicked this way comes." (IV.i.48-49) Witches, cryptic prophecies, and tragic character flaws encourage theatre goers to step into a world in which forces beyond rational thought and personal control. We'll be discussing Shakespeare's motives in penning this play under the patronage of James I, the same individual who commissioned a new translation of the Christian Bible, believed in the Divine Right of Kings, and penned a book entitled Daemonologie based on his personal experience in the North Berwick witch trials of 1590. "Out, damned spoil!" (V.i.37) The Study Circle will investigate Raphael Holinshed's Chronicles of England, Scotlande, and Irelande, one of Shakespeare's primary historical sources for the play, including what is known about Gruoch ingen Boite, more familiarly known as Lady Macbeth. "(Life) is nothing / Told by an Idiot, full of sound and fury / Signifying nothing." (V.v.32-34) We will conclude our exploration of Macbeth by discussing its influence on modern authors and recent film portrayals of the play.

Shakespeare's plays were meant to be experienced as theatre, so I encourage class members to view at least one film adaptation of the play, as well as reading Shakespeare's play. With a mere four classes to cover Macbeth, study group members will need to be fully prepared for discussion by the first session. You may use any edition of the play as long as the text is unabridged. "Double, double, toil and trouble / Fire burn and cauldron bubble" (IV.i.12-13) Join the Provocative Literature Study Circle for our discussion of Macbeth – it's going to be a fascinating four weeks!

George (Loebach) Riesen loves to read, research, and argue about books. A North Iowa native, George holds a BA in English from Yale University in New Haven, Connecticut. She researches and writes the program notes for Una Vocis Choral Ensemble.



This presentation will cover my experiences from the beginning to the present as a caretaker of a wood duck nest box trail along Beaver Dam Creek south of Burchinal. Areas covered will be nest box designs and construction, location and setup, suitable nesting materials, protection from predators, duckling jump counts, as well some surprises along the way.

2022 PRAIRIE SCHOOL ARCHITECTURE LECTURE SERIES

Mason City is known as the "hotbed" of architecture because of our many well-preserved Prairie School architectural treasures. Tourists come from all over the globe to tour the Frank Lloyd Wright designed Stockman House and Historic Park Inn Hotel, and to learn about the many homes designed by his associates including Walter Burley Griffin. Griffin is responsible for the beautiful Rock Crest-Rock Glen historic neighborhood along Willow Creek.

This series of three sessions of two lectures each will cover an in-depth look at the development and characteristics of Frank Lloyd Wright's Prairie School architecture and their continued influence.

Dr. Robert E. McCoy originated the six-part Prairie School Architecture Lecture Series and presented them faithfully for many years. He had donated the depth of his educational material to the River City Society for Historic Preservation to be continued. While it has been updated, Dr. McCoy's research is at the foundation of the lectures.

The Prairie School lectures will be held in the McCoy Architectural Interpretive Center located at 520 1st St. NE in Mason City. They will be presented on three consecutive Tuesdays in March: March 8, 15, & 22. Each session covers two lectures begin at 2 pm and ending at 4:15 pm with a short break in-between.
